The Importance of Gifting to the Lititz Historical Foundation

In the early 1960's a group of Lititz men decided the town needed a museum to showcase the historical significance of the 1756 Moravian community. The Johannes Mueller house was purchased at 137 E. Main Street with funds remaining from the 200th anniversary of the town.

A plea was put out for donations of early memorabilia and family possessions noteworthy to display in this new venue. By 1964 a sizable collection of Lititz artifacts had been accumulated to open the museum doors to visitors.

Many local auction items were purchased in the early years of LHF to continue the integrity of the museum's inventory. As the prices of Lancaster County antiques became unaffordable to those other than dealers, board members once again reached out to members for donations of Lititz collectibles. The last fifty five years of

gifting from people who are passionate about the preservation of our town's history has made LHF one of the most visited museums in Pennsylvania with 49 states and 40 countries represented. Many many people, some living in Lititz and some who have moved throughout the world, have contributed to this small educational museum with roots stemming from the Moravian Church. Items from the beginning of the town in 1756 thru the war years and up until 2019 are housed not only in the Mueller House but also The Lititz Museum next door.

One recent noteworthy contribution to LHF is a beautiful framed painting of Jacob Mease Fry.

Mr. Fry was Lancaster County's oldest Civil War veteran (recorded in his obituary October 13, 1938) at the age of ninety-nine years. In the 1900 census Jacob and Hettie lived at 18 Front Street with their daughter Katie until they moved to 315 E. Main Street (rear). Jacob and Hettie had three sons and one daughter all living in Warwick Township. Jacob was a cigar maker by trade.

The August 11, 1932 issue of The Lititz Record had this to say about Jacob Fry:

"Hence it is noteworthy when a survivor can be found who can recall the days of conflict and who has descendants who will ever cherish his valor and comfort him in his declining years. Jacob M. Fry, who has his home with Mr. and Mrs. Harry Haldeman of Rothsville, being his granddaughter, was 93 years old on Tuesday.

Mr. Fry enlisted for service in the Union armies about a year before its close." He was a cook in the Army and served on picket duty. He is buried at the Millport Cemetery.

Another very interesting donation is a February 26, 1866 receipt in the amount of \$1.50 for a year's subscription to the "The People's Friend and Observer" published each Wednesday by Johann Bar's Sons in the City of Lancaster, Pa. The subscription price is 1 thaler (dollar) 50 cents per year in advance.* (Translated from German script*) is also part of LHF ephemera collection.

Recently, while doing excavations to their parking lot, members of the Lititz Fire Company got a surprise when they unearthed something other than dirt. It was the foundation and old bricks from the former site of the Keystone Underwear Mills!

Established in January of 1898, at the peak of its existence, the business turned out 109 dozen pieces of men's underwear daily. Organized by Samuel B. Erb, Adam Long, and Israel G. Erb, the operation would be incorporated in 1905. In July of 1918, a new dye house was built. This structure still stands today and lies to the south of the fire company's parking lot. Annual Plant Exchange is May 5th

The Lititz Historical Foundation in conjunction with the Lititz Garden Club will hold its Annual Plant Ex-

change on Sunday, May 5th at 1:30 PM. The event will be held in the Mary Oehme Gardens, behind the museum buildings at 137-145 East Main Street in Lititz. The event is rain or shine. The plants to exchange must be perennials and must have identification tags for each plant. Each plant must be placed in a container for transportation. Upon arrival, a ticket will be handed out for each plant. The plants must be placed in categories including: Sun, Shade, Exotic, Bulbs, Herbs and Ground Cover. These tickets can be redeemed for another plant after all plants are placed in the categories and the attendees have some time to explore the categories.
