Discovery 55 Years Ago Yields Interesting Find in Mueller House

By March of 1964 the Mueller House property was in the possession of the Lititz Historical Foundation. While it was and indeed remains a very important historic structure in Lititz, at the time it was purchased it needed a lot of tender loving care to restore it back to its former glory.

During the restoration, a rare find was discovered by Chester Mowrer, a local stone mason by trade, who found a packet of letters from 1869 that had been tucked away into a window frame in the Mueller House. The letters were from a "Millie" to Mollie Zitzman, who occupied the home at the time with her parents Frederick and Susanna. Mollie was also the granddaughter of Johannes Mueller who built the home in 1792.

The huge, noteworthy event of July 1869 was a balloon ascension, when a Professor Light sailed from York to Lancaster in 45 minutes.

Millie writes:

"On last Saturday there was a grand balloon ascension here at Market Square. Professor Light went up in it and he promised to take Mr. Dale with him. Well just a little time before he started, he told Mr. Dale he could not take him for he was afraid the balloon would not hold him. Professor Light landed in Lancaster about 45 minutes after he started from here. He came to York on Saturday evening and told the folks all about it. He has been up 93 times and he said he is determined to go up 100 times. He did look beautiful after he got up about several hundred yards from the ground. He took some paper and other things along with him which he threw out after he got away up in the air.


Promoted as an "old time country show" a cast of nearly 50 dealers will present a wide range of interesting, reasonably priced country wares and dry goods.

Discovery 55 years ago yields interesting find in Mueller House Con't:

The name of the balloon is the Albion. He is going up in Columbia on Friday so I was told. There were over three thousand country folks who came to town to witness the ascension."

Zitzman's pen pal also writes of several ginger cakes that were eaten that day, and how she flirted with a couple of "sports" from Baltimore. She also said that she was looking forward to the Festival at the York Fairgrounds. However in the next letter to Zitzman, she mentions parental interference, and writes that nobody attended the fair but "hired girls," and she was forbidden to go. She also sent her love to Millie Bender and a Mr. Peters, and suggested that Peters be given a glass of "mead" for her.

Millie also regretted not being able to attend the "hops" at the Lititz Hotel (now the General Sutter Hotel). While these letters many seem trivial between two friends, now, 150 years later, they shed some very interesting light on the happenings of the time.

Interestingly enough, Mollie's father, Frederick Zitzman, served as Lititz's second postmaster. He held this position from 1830 to 1849.

**Dr. James A. Dale was a wealthy druggist based in York during the time this letter was written. Fascinated with the hobby, he would take many balloon flights between 1869 and 1886.*

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Blaze Destroys Lititz Building 80 Years Ago This Year

In June, 1931, it was decided that offices of The Walton Corporation would relocate to Lititz from New York. The printing arm of the business would also be moved to Lititz.

On Friday, May 12, 1939 at 3:45 p.m., a terrible fire broke out along North Water Street at the structure.

According to reports, the fire began by a spark that was thrown from a train switch. Before the blaze could be contained, it spread to one end of the third floor of the building. During the crisis, approximately 35 employees of the local business; but luckily, they all escaped to safety. Everything inside was lost except a few pages of company records, several typewriters, and other pieces of office equipment. The loss was estimated at \$100,000.

At the time of the blaze, there was 100 tons of paper inside the structure. It was actually the second time the building caught on fire —the first incident occurred in 1908, and was totally rebuilt afterwards.


Originally erected in 1902, the building first served as the headquarters of the Animal Trap Company of America. Originally, Mr. J.M. Mast decided to locate his trap manufacturing company there, and approval was granted with much enthusiasm from the community.

In 1957 this telegram arrived to Lititz from Los Angeles. It was from Lititz native Bob Longenecker, who was a Hollywood as a talent agent and radio executive. Longenecker was married to Hollywood star Ruth Hussey, who was featured in such major motion pictures such as “The Philadelphia Story,” “Flight Command,” and many more. That year, Hussey would be the special guest during Lititz’s annual 4th of July celebration, and would crown the Queen of Candles.

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
