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Monument to John Augustus Sutter

The most notable non-native of Lititz was General John A. Sutter, an early California pioneer and landowner in the Golden State. He founded Sacramento in 1839 and on his land the Gold Rush of 1849 began with fortune seekers rushing to get rich with newly-discovered nuggets of gold. In 1871 he moved to Lititz with his wife Anna to be close to their grandchildren who were taking advantage of the excellent schools in the town.

John Sutter's grandson attended John Beck Academy and granddaughters Carmen and Anna Eliza entered Linden

Hall.

"General" Sutter built a beautiful home at 19 East Main Street - the first home in Lititz to have indoor plumbing producing both hot and cold running water. His new home also was located closer to Washington, DC where he traveled yearly in an effort to reclaim some of his lost land expenses during the gold rush.

Sutter died in Washington in 1880 while still trying to persuade Congress for reimbursement of his lost finances. He was brought back to Lititz for burial, and because of his status as a fine gentleman, the Lititz Moravian Congregation honored him with a plot in God's Acre where he and his wife remain.

In 1938, members of The Lititz Chamber of Commerce raised money to have a monument made and sent to the city of Sacramento in honor of Sutter. The inscription reads: John A. Sutter 1803-1880 eminent pioneer of California Who founded Sacramento in 1839 and over whose lands poured the gold rush of 1849 Lived his last nine years in Lititz and is interred in an Honored corner of the

nearby Moravian cemetery. Erected by The Lancaster County Historical Society and the Borough of Lititz 1939.

Our 61st Annual Antiques Show is June 28-29th!

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
Our 61st Year!

Sutter monument Con't:

On August 12, 1939 at 3:00pm in the afternoon, the great grandson of John Sutter, Howard J. Hull, unveiled the monument which was placed in the front lawn of The General Sutter Hotel on the square. A crowd of dig-

nitaries and local townspeople gathered for the celebration of two periods of


Sutter's life.

Unfortunately, the cost of shipping the large monument by train to Sacramento was not budgeted in the Chamber of Commerce's fundraising endeavors so it sat in the front lawn of the hotel.

The owners of the hotel approached members and asked if it could be moved to another location. During remodeling of the General Sutter Hotel, the monument was indeed moved to make a space for the construction of the west side of the building. But one day, it was completely gone. So, what happened to this controversial homage to Sutter?

Months and then years passed but nobody could ascertain the location of the missing monument. Finally in 2019 the mystery was solved. Gladys Fry Crowl, a well-known historian and native of Lititz inquired as to the where-

abouts of the missing monument. About 1958, Broad Street was being resurfaced and the old street debris was being buried on part of the Nuss farm along Kissel Hill Road.

A borough employee removed the monument and buried it with the street debris. Fortunately the bronze plaque on the monument was removed and placed on the outside wall of the now Lititz Springs Inn.

In the mid 1960's houses were built along the west side of Kissel Hill Road on the Nuss property. In one of the property's backyards, buried ten feet deep, is the 1939 concrete portion of the monument in honor of General John Sutter. It was made of granite, so many years into the future an archaeologist will discover this piece of prehistoric art and place it in a museum display.


Mysterious Lititz book now available!
